## **GENERAL CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION (GCE)**

The assessment of a language syllabus Speaking component is shown as 'With Distinction in Speaking', 'With Merit in Speaking' or 'With Pass in Speaking'.

## **GCE ORDINARY LEVEL (GCE O Level)**

GCE O Level grades A\*(a\*), A(a), B(b), C(c), D(d) or E(e) indicate the standard reached, grade A\*(a\*) being the highest and grade E(e) the lowest. Performances below the standard of grade E(e) are not reported on certificates.

Certain language syllabuses contain oral tests, some of which are separately endorsed. Where the candidate has passed such an oral test this is reported on the certificate.

The text Advanced Subsidiary, Advanced Level or Ordinary Level prefixing the grade awarded indicates the level that the grade was awarded for the syllabus.
